CATHOLIC EDUCATION: CHALLENGES AND ASPIRATIONS

The title of this article would more appropriately be suited for a doctoral dissertation; the topic, nonetheless, is cogent and timely. Ambitious as it may seem for a brief article, reflection on the issue by all stakeholders in this important ministry is indeed necessary. Much of the recent discussion on the matter has centered, it seems, primarily on the organizational, data-gathering and economic aspects of the enterprise. So, following the example of our Lord, allow me to employ a story in order to simplify the notion.

A shepherd was herding his flock in a remote pasture when out of a dust cloud sped a brandnew Mercedes toward him. The driver, a young man in an Armani suit, Gucci shoes, Ray-Ban sunglasses and D&G tie, leans out the window and asks the shepherd, "If I



tell you exactly how many sheep you have in your flock, will you give me one?" The shepherd looks at the man, who is obviously impressed with himself, then looks at his peacefully grazing flock and calmly answers, "Sure. Why not?"

The young man parks his car, whips out his Dell notebook computer, connects it to his AT&T cell phone, surfs to a NASA page on the Internet, where he calls up a GPS satellite navigation system to get an exact fix on his location which he then feeds to another NASA satellite that scans the area in an ultra-high-depth resolution photo. The young man then opens the digital photo in Adobe Photoshop and exports it to an image processing facility in Hamburg, Germany. Within seconds, he receives an email on his Palm Pilot that the image has been processed and the data stored. He then accesses a MS-SQL database through an ODBC connected Excel spreadsheet with hundreds of complex formulas. He uploads all of this data via an email on his Blackberry and quickly receives a response. Finally, he prints out a full-color, 150-page report on his hi-tech, miniaturized HP LaserJet printer and turns to the shepherd and says, "You have exactly 1586 sheep."

"That's right! Well, I guess you can take one of my sheep," says the shepherd. He watches the young man select one of the animals and looks on amusingly as the young man stuffs it into the trunk of his car. Then the shepherd says to the young man, "Hey, if I can tell you exactly what your business is, will you give him back to me?"

The young man thinks about it and sees the shepherd's lack of sophistication and says, "Okay, go for it?" Without a pause, the shepherd confidently states: "You're a consultant." "Wow! That's incredible," says the young man, "but how did you guess that?"

"No guessing required," answered the shepherd. "You showed up here even though nobody called you; you want to get paid for an answer I already knew; to a question I never asked; and you know absolutely nothing about my business. Now, get my dog out of the trunk of your car."

While institutions of Catholic education are oriented toward and obligated to strive for academic excellence, they cannot be reduced to simply that. Similarly, while the authentic disciple of Jesus lives in and is influenced by this world, the human person cannot be reduced to a



random or meaningless product of evolution nor be enslaved to pretentious ideologies that subjectify truth and mitigate the meaning of words and language. Pope Benedict XVI reminds us: "Only where God is recognized does life truly begin; only when we meet the living God in Christ do we know what life is. ... Each of us is the result of a thought of God. Each of us is willed, each of us is loved, each of us is necessary. There is nothing more beautiful than to be surprised ... by the encounter with Christ. There is nothing more beautiful than to know Him and to speak to others of our friendship with Him." One of the great challenges of Catholic education, in every age and particularly in our own, is precisely in confronting the "this world" view that seeks to remove God and His authority over His creation and from our awareness and discernment. The slithering prince of this world is seductively suggesting that we can find our fulfillment in ourselves or in other fallen creatures. Consequently, the great temptation is that we grasp at control, absolute control over our destiny, at all costs; even if it demands that we deny Truth and Charity. The very standard of our Catholic faith – the crucifix, however, stands as a sign of contradiction to this approach to life and boldly reveals both the supreme humility of God and His abiding mercy. As individuals, families and societies, we are seduced "to live for the moment," to strive for convenience and to promote the "self" as the end-all of everything that exists. We become dependent and then addicted to these things and programs that will make us better, that will make our lives more fulfilled and convenient. Yet, we find ourselves shackled to these things and more and more alienated from our true selves and the very Author of Life and God of Love. Often, we find ourselves yielding our freedom to someone else, because it's convenient and discover that we have been lulled into a state of incapacity of knowledge, opinion or free

choice. While these tactics are not new in the "bag of tricks" of the Father of Lies, the ever-increasing notion among those who call themselves Catholics that dismisses our relationship with God as non-essential and non-consequential to being; or tolerates His existence, as long as His presence demands nothing from us, is greatly disturbing. In such a world-view, the idea that God would lower Himself to become the servant of His creation to the point of death, death on a cross, is both absurd and a scandal. Yet, it is precisely this mystery that we proclaim, celebrate and adore as the source and summit of our Catholic faith in the Most Holy Eucharist. And, at the core of our existence, this mysterious Reality is set as the foundation and capstone, the Beginning and the End, the meaning and purpose of the existence of Catholic School. Diminishing this aspect in the planning, engaging and implementing Catholic education on all levels lessens the Divine commission to proclaim the Gospel and dishonors our human dignity as created, redeemed and sanctified by our Most High and Holy God.

The aspirations of Catholic education, while dependent on the temporalities of this world, cannot be distracted by them in pursuit of its ultimate purpose and divine mandate. Institutions of Catholic education: must recommit themselves to the Truth and Charity of the Gospel of Jesus Christ; must instill in their students that, as persons created in God's image, we are servants and seekers of the Truth and not its source nor designers; must proclaim that Love can in no way be reduced to simply a human reality, but that it is the Divine Nature itself in which we are graced by God's Holy Will and the Incarnation of Jesus Christ to participate and toward which to strive. In a culture less and less influenced by the Gospel, this aspiration is in and of itself another challenge. It is incumbent for Catholic Schools to accept, reclaim and proclaim the nobility and dignity of the human person in accord with the loving design of the Creator. In his recently posted article, titled "Creation and the Order of Love," on *The Catholic Thing* website, Stephen P. White wrote the following:

Human dignity is a consequence of both our origin and our end. We are made in God's image and likeness, and we are made for communion – both here, albeit imperfectly, in this life, and forever with God in the next. To grasp human dignity is to grasp something of the whole order of Creation and of our place and purpose in that order. As Pope Francis writes in Laudato Sí: "The universe did not emerge as the result of arbitrary omnipotence, a show of force or a desire for self-assertion. Creation is of the order of love." Creation is the order of love. When we cooperate with the order of Creation, we grow and become more like the One who created us. Sin, by contrast, arises from and causes the disordering of our loves. When we love the wrong things, or love them in the wrong way, we not only violate the order of things, we invite further disorder, for ourselves and others. Sin masks and diminishes our dignity, though never destroys it entirely. (https://www.thecatholicthing.org/2024/04/04/creation-and-the-order-of-love/)

In the days leading up to Jesus' Passion and Death, certain Greeks, captivated by His preaching and the stories of His works, approach Philip and Andrew to seek a meeting with Jesus. He responds not using references to the Old Testament or the Hebrew traditions, but to nature to make His point. He says: "Amen, Amen, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit. Whoever loves his life loses it, and whoever hates his life in this world will preserve it for eternal life. Whoever serves Me must follow Me, and where I am, there also will My servant be. The Father will honor whoever serves Me. ... Now is the time of judgment on this world; now the ruler of this world will be driven out. And when I am lifted up from the earth, I will draw everyone to Myself." (Jn 12: 24-26, 31-32) The language seems harsh, but verses 31 and 32 create the context of what Jesus is speaking. When He speaks of "loving" or "hating" one's life, He says "in this world," whose ruler (Satan) will be driven out when vanquishes death and all the other limitations that bind us to the Evil One and his realm of death, through His resurrection.

This is not so much a teaching about death or about hating ourselves or about suffering, as it is a lesson about LOVE and moving from narcissistic self-centeredness to Eucharistic self-giving. We learn the lessons

of genuine love, each time we die to ourselves through our acts of charity; each time we place the needs of another before our own; each time we give without expecting anything in return; each time we do the right thing rather than the convenient. In this Jesus broadens our perspective and opens our hearts to embrace the Cross, which reminds us that He did not come into our world to remove suffering and death ... rather, He came to fill this world with His Presence giving us hope in our pursuit of the fullness of life and love in eternity. Still today, we hope and strive to hand on to our children the light of Christ and His Good News to prepare them to enter an often-violent world of fragile peace, broken promises, and a frightful disrespect for human life.



The eminent French chemist, stated: "When I approach a child, he inspires in me two sentiments; tenderness for what he is, and respect for what he may become." In light of the above-mentioned teaching of Jesus to the Greeks, Pasteur offers a strategy for all stakeholders in Catholic education (students, parents, extended family, teachers, administrators, consecrated religious clergy, alumni, parishioners and benefactors) to accept and accompany with tenderness each child as he/she is, a child of God; the seed planted in our midst that must undergo the arduous process of "dving to self" in order to discover him/her self authentically. At the same time, we must stand back in wonder and awe of the interior potential waiting to burst forth into a new life for the good of the whole world. Pope Benedict XVI in an address to a group of clergy reflected on the state of the world saying: "It is becoming ever clearer that only moral values and strong convictions, and sacrifices, make it possible to live and to build the world. ... If there is no moral force in souls, if there is no readiness to suffer for these values, then a better world is not built; indeed, on the contrary, the world deteriorates every day,

selfishness dominates and destroys all. ... It can be seen that morality as such does not survive and is not effective unless it is deeply rooted in convictions that truly provide certainty and the strength to suffer for a love that grows in suffering and is the substance of life. In the end, in fact, love alone enables us to live, and love is always also suffering: it matures in suffering and provides the strength to suffer for good without taking oneself into account at the actual moment." (25 July 2005) These are the core values that form the mission of Catholic education, our school and our desire to build a civilization of love and a culture of life.

Ever grateful for your continued prayers, interest, generosity and constancy in response to that appeal that has echoed across more than a century, you challenge each of us: students, faculty, administration and staff to strive evermore competently to fulfill that mandate from our Lord Himself to be His witnesses to the ends of the earth. You allow us to teach about the real world, which Jesus called the Kingdom of God that is present, albeit imperfectly, in this world but fulfilled in the hereafter. We can challenge our children to know, love and serve God; to seek the truth of God's world in charity and to live life in this world in preparation for eternal life. We can teach that words have meaning and that they reveal both the reality of the idea or thing described and the integrity of the speaker. Looking into the signs of the times with the light of Faith and Knowledge, we ask that you remain with us as we continue this awesome task of love by forming the future of our parish, our community and our world. Your gifts make a huge difference in the lives of our students. Be assured of our profound gratitude and a remembrance in our prayers.
